









# PHYSICAL

Rape, indecent assault, forced oral sex, unwelcomed physical contact, etc.




### NON-PHYSICAL



Voyeurism, exhibitionism, disturbing leering, creating a sexually intimidating environment, etc.


### SPEECH-RELATED



Obscene language, making obscene comments about one's body, sending unsolicited sexually explicit messages, etc.

# IMAGE-RELATED

Recording, uploading, circulating, or threatening to publicise one's intimate images without their consent, etc.



# REMINDER

- Whether the relationship is marital, romantic, acquainted or unfamiliar, any forced sexual contact without regard to the will of the other party is a form of sexual violence.
- Everyone could be a perpetrator or victim regardless of their identity.





#### Consensual or not? Always ask for it!

When someone seems hesitant/ goes silent



NOT giving consent!

always doublecheck with them!




Blaming someone for not expressing their seuxal consent

Ask for certain consent before starting any kind of sexual interactions.

The person initiating sexual interaction has the responsibility to ensure that certain consent is given by the other person.

Any acts of sexual interaction that violates or disregards a person's will = SEXUAL VIOLENCE





## Do you agree with these statements?

Women get sexually assaulted because they wear revealing clothes.



FALSE! Regardless of genders, we all have our own freedom and rights to decide how and what to wear. Perpetrators should take responsibility for their own wrongdoing instead of making excuses.

Perpetrators of sexual violence are usually strangers.



FALSE! According to RainLily's service-user statistics, about 80% of the victim-survivors are acquainted with the perpetrators, including friends and family.

People got sexually assaulted because they didn't fight back hard enough.



**FALSE!** Sexual violence happens because the perpetrator disregards or violates the victim-survivor's will. It is common for victims to find it hard to react immediately or experience an automatic "freeze response" when frightened, threatened, or under emotional blackmail.

When you gave consent to be photographed, you should have expected that the images would be seen by others.



FALSE! Consent to be photographed ‡ consent to the publication of the images. Only the person being photographed has the right to determine who gets to view their intimate images. We should not justify non-consensual publishing and viewing of intimate images.







# What can I do if I experience sexual violence?

- 1 Trust your feelings.
- Leave as soon as possible to ensure your own safety.
- If you have been subjected to penetrative sexual assault, you may consider seeking medical treatment, undergoing a physical examination, and/or using emergency contraception.
- A Retain all relevant evidence for possible future action.
- Contact RainLily and let counsellors keep you company.
